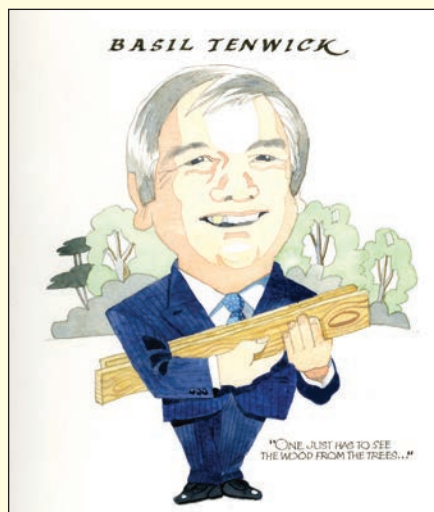
Board meetings were on the first Tuesday of each month and when the meeting was over the directors would adjourn to the bar and snooker room. It
